Study Questions: Session 4 – Chapter 3 “Are There No Good People?”

1. Read Mark 10:18 (10:17-22).

Who is good? What does this mean about people?

2. Read Matthew 5:28

What does it mean to commit a sin “in your heart”?

Sadly, given the opportunity, many people commit adultery.

Explain why other people, given the same opportunities, don't do it.

(hint: the answer is not a “church-approved reason”)

3. Jones says, “we live in a society of adulterous murderers who think they are good people because they aren't acting out their sinful desires due to self-interest.” (p. 67)

Do you agree? Are there any other reasons to think people are good?

4. Read Romans 3:12-15.

What's the difference between a good person and a nice person?

Read the first paragraph in the book starting under “Examples of Human ‘Goodness’.” Now read Luke 6:32-34. Compare the motivations for being nice with the motivation for being good. Can a human being have any proper motivation for being good?

5. Hebrews 2:15 says that through the fear of death we are subject to lifelong slavery.

Read the middle paragraph of p. 69.

What are some ways Jones offers that motivate people to act because of the fear of death? Do you agree with him?

6. We want to admire heroes, and this is right! (see handout from *Don't Waste Your Life* by John Piper)

However, deeds of heroism cannot save you. Jones seems to say that sometimes heroism is merely participation in something of lasting worth, in an attempt to achieve “ersatz immortality”. Do you agree?

Does Jones' account of heroism help get God “off the hook” for the ultimate fate of those who do heroic deeds, yet don't believe Him?
